

Clyde branch outing to Great Cumbrae

18 June 2022 (1015-1645)

Leader: Eddie Williams

Participants: 18

Weather: Some drizzle whilst on the outward ferry but dry throughout whilst on the island. Plenty of sun but steady westerly winds, gusting quite strongly at times made it feel cool occasionally.

No of species recorded: 54 (see list below)

15 of us met at Largs ferry terminal and got the 1015 ferry to the Island – a short 10-minute ride. We were met at the Cumbrae Slip by Janet & David Palmar (who were already on the Island) and our Leader Eddie Williams. We walked round the north and west sides of Great Cumbrae towards Millport along a relatively quiet road by the sea, then by a footpath over the hill. The total walking distance was approximately five miles.



Shortly after we set off, Eddie found the first of several **Common Lizards** which we all enjoyed. The island seems to be particularly good for them and Eddie recorded 29 individuals earlier this month (on 6th June). Notable birds during the first stretch to White Bay included **Greylag** (pair on the shore) **Ringed Plover**, **Common Sandpiper**, **Black Guillemot**, **Sand Martin**, **Whitethroat**, **Mistle Thrush** and **Bullfinch**.

We carried on along the road checking both sides of the road for birds. At Greycraigs, Eddie counted 66 **Common Gulls**, someone picked out a **Red-breasted Merganser** (our only one) at White Bay where there was a very obliging pair of **Greenfinches** feeding close to us on the shore. A **Sedge Warbler** with food was seen well at Skate Bay with a solitary **Curlew** at Skate Point. An **Oystercatcher** chick was seen at one point and we quickly moved off another spot as there was an **Oystercatcher** nest with 3 eggs very close to the road and an anxious adult nearby.

Up to four **Ravens** were great to see. **Eiders** were plentiful and we saw several groups of ducklings. There weren't many seabirds around except **Gannet** but Bill (a seasoned seawatcher) picked out a couple of distant **Fulmar** and some **Guillemot** through his telescope. It was good to see both **Meadow Pipit** and **Rock Pipit** close together to be able to clearly see the differences.

We had our packed lunches (topped up with items bought from the Café) at Fintray Bay where toilets were also available.

Chaffinch and Robin joined us at lunch (the only ones I saw during the whole outing!). Other birds recorded in the Fintray area included Blackcap.

We left the road at Fintray Bay and headed uphill on the Targets Walk (a short walking route to Millport). A number of **Small Heath** butterflies were seen but the birding highlight was a fine male **Sparrowhawk** which gave us a long view as it crossed a large open area on the Upper Targets Walk. The views from up there were fabulous.

We reached the Golf Course, had brilliant views of a very obliging **Song Thrush** and took a detour to the Lower Reservoir where we had a pair of **Little Grebe** and our only **Great Black-backed Gull** of the trip. In a ditch beside the Golf Road, we had a nice male **Siskin** drinking. We arrived in Millport at about 1630 and everyone got a bus back to the Cumbrae Slip. A **Black-headed Gull** in Ballochmartin Bay (seen from the bus) was the last species of the outing.

It had been a great outing with good company, some good birds and it stayed dry! We are particularly grateful to **Eddie Williams** who led the outing and shared his extensive knowledge with us. It was great to see some familiar faces from previous outings as well welcome five new ones for whom it was their first SOC outing since we started them back again after the Lockdown. Three species (Gannet, Ringed Plover and Sedge Warbler) were added to our cumulative list of species recorded on our SOC outings bringing the total to 119 species.
